Steps to getting started:

- 1. Identify who was living in America in this time period.
- 2. Note names, ages, ethnicities, locations.

Getting ahead:

- Profile your ancestor's neighborhood or community using the 1860 census (age, place of birth, occupation), county history, newspapers, photo archives.
- Get in touch with local historical societies and repositories for information on local events.

Questions to ask when looking at your ancestors' lives:

- 1. Did their community raise companies or home guard units?
- 2. Did they live in an area where armies were constantly passing through?
- 3. What was the aftermath of nearby battles?
- 4. How hard hit was their town with deaths related to the war?
- 5. Did your family stay in their wartime community after the war or did they move to a different community?
