eBay is the world's largest online auction community. There are about 182 million registered users around the world. In 2019, there were 1.3 billion listings. In 2018 80% of all items sold were new. About 28% of all sellers are located in the U. S.

You do not need to be a member in order to search for items on eBay, but you will need to register in order to bid or purchase on the site. - I. The key to your success is determined by the way you formulate each search.
 - A. Search for surnames, places, or phrases.
 - 1. Place a "check" in the "Include in Description" box.
 - 2. To narrow search results, use quotation marks around your search phrase such as "New York documents" or "Icabod Crane."
 - 3. Eliminate items by using the "Advanced Search" option to exclude words from your search.
 - B. Search for "old family bibles" and "antique family bibles." Use multiple terms.
- II. Use the "Save this Search" option to receive daily e-mail alerts.
- III. Search eBay's foreign websites as well. All you need is the two-letter country domain extension such as "ebay.<u>fr</u>" which represents France. You can view a list of country domain extension codes at: https://www.worldstandards.eu/other/tlds/.
