Finding Relationships to Your Matches

Question: Many of my matches have private trees, unlinked trees, undeveloped trees, or no trees. How can I determine the most recent common ancestors shared by me and my DNA matches?

Methods:

- Scan unlinked trees for clues
- Messaging
- ► ThruLines
- Extending Trees
- Dot System

Method 1 : Messaging

Use the Ancestry.com messaging system to contact your match and request information on their lineage.

Often matches do not respond

- ➤ Your matches may not receive the message or notice the icon that shows they have a message.
- ▶ They may not regularly visit Ancestry.
- ▶ They may be working on other priorities.

If they don't respond:

- ► Google their username. Search FaceBook, LinkedIn, etc.
- If they have a GEDmatch account, check for an email address.
- ► Find their postal/email address in FamilyTreeNow.com.

Method 2: ThruLines

- Set up ThruLines and use it to identify you and your matches' relationships and common ancestors.
- Click here for ThruLines set up <u>Instructions</u>
- ► For ThruLines to work, you must link your family tree to your DNA test, and ensure that your linked tree is public or private but searchable.
- ThruLines will not work for matches with unlinked trees, trees that are private and not searchable, and with no trees.



Method 3: Extending Trees

- Extend your match's small Public Tree or Unlinked Tree back to your ancestors using genealogy. Obituaries can be helpful in identifying family groups.
- Some Public Trees only include privatized individuals. Also, private trees are inaccessible.
- It may be difficult to identify where your match fits into Unlinked Trees. Your match may not be the person at the base of the tree.
- Building a tree from a few known family members, can be difficult. Use the "Search on Ancestry" button for help in extending a lineage. Review member trees with extensive sources.




Method 4: Dot System

common ancestral couple.

- Assign a color to each Ancestral couple back to the 2nd great grandparents or further.
- ▶ Use ThruLines to find known ancestral couples for your DNA matches.
- ▶ Use the <u>Add/Edit Button</u> to add the color groups relating to the most recent ancestral couples of your matches.
- Click on the <u>Shared Matches Button</u> of known matches and tag shared matches with the same dot color as held by the known match.
- Pull up your match with the unknown lineage from your match list. Click on the <u>Shared Matches Button</u>. Scan the dot colors of the shared matches. This will give clues on who is your most recent shared
