Using Google Translate

[Google Translator](#)

1. Start at the site you wish to translate (example <http://francegenweb.org>)
2. On that page, in the box at the top of the page where the URL is displayed, copy the whole URL
3. Go to [Google Translate](#)
4. Under the word “Translate” paste the URL you copied from the page you want translated.
5. You may click on English, Spanish, French or Detect Language.
6. When you enter words, phrases or URLs, it will translate for you.

There are many other translation sites on the web. If you google “translation sites” you will see many sites for translating. Play around with them and decide which one works the best for you.
